Such things as shooting at targets on the ground or rocks in the ground result in ricochets that can leave our range and strike our neighbours' residences. This will definitely have our range shut down. If all members observe the rules, and point out the rules to other members who might not know them or are not following them as expected, we will continue to have a range to shoot at.

The evening was a success and the lucky winners of the draws, and the successful bidders on the auction items, went home with some great merchandise. 

HI- TECH FISHING

Let me start by stating that there are thousands of anglers every year that are successful catching lots of fish without the use of the following electronics, however for us techies, this is a great time to be an angler.

There are Sonar units offered now that not only show sonar readings, they may also be equipped with GPS, Radar, Weather, Satellite Radio, Downrigger Controls and the newest technology side/down imaging.

Some of the newer trolling motors offered by Minn-Kota have

GPS built into the head unit. These I-Pilot units allow you to automatically track back on previous routes, set trolling speeds and bearing, lock onto a position and hold you within approximately 5 feet of that area and store numerous tracks, routes and waypoints. All of these functions can be performed with the use of a remote control



with on screen readout and is about the size of a cell phone If you have one of the newer smart phones there are numerous fishing apps and Navionics mapping apps that are available for most units. I have the Navionics app on my phone and it has


pretty good detail on most of the lakes I have checked. The pic to the left is off my phone of Lac La Nonne. More detail is available when you zoom in.



Today is definitely the age of high tech electronics, and the latest hi-tech technology to hit the market over the past few years are sonar units equipped with side and down imaging. Humminbird was the first manufacturer to introduce imaging technology and continues to improve the clar-


ity and resolution every year. Although imaging technology is not as clear as an underwater camera it is getting close, and in years to come I believe it will be. Side Imaging technology has a vast viewing range compared to underwater cameras with the higher end units extending out to 240 feet on both sides of the boat. Imaging technology does take some practice on the water, to interpret what you are actually seeing, but the information it provides is, in a word.....awesome.

Down imaging offers another view again which is basically a very wide view to both sides of the boat, but only about 2-3 wide extending from the back



of the boat. Another good feature of these units is that you can view spit screens, showing side imaging, down imaging and standard sonar all on the screen at the same time, but there are about 20 different options from you to choose from, depending on your need at the time.

This fall Humminbird is about to release another improvement in imaging technology called 360 Imaging. 360 imaging can view a maximum of 150 feet in all directions including forward. This is the first sonar unit to ever offer front viewing

plete screen updating every few seconds, unlike standard sonar or imaging which scrolls across the screen. There will be various speed and range settings with the capability to split and zoom on each view separately or the full 360 view. If you identify some particular structure or fish you will be able to toggle



your cursor and mark a waypoint on that spot. Humminbird is continuing to field test this product and add improvements as they are recognized. Imaging technology is not cheap, and you can expect to pay a few hundred dollars for just the sonar/down imaging units and up to a few thousand dollars for the most advanced imaging units.

If you are looking at purchasing your

first sonar unit or upgrading the unit you have be sure to check out the new Imaging units at your local sporting goods store. I purchased my first sonar unit in 1987 and have seen the improvements over the years. I believe imaging technology will continue to improve over the next few years and I am very excited to see just how good it gets!

Whatever unit you decide on, be sure to get out there fishing this summer and take a kid fishing. Fishing, in my opinion is one of the most enjoyable family activities and I look forward to getting out on the water soon!

Memberships

Sherwood Park Fish and Game Association Membership

Sherwood Park Fish and Game Association (SPFGA) consists of a variety of age groups, special interest groups, target shooters, hunters, fishermen/women, bird watchers, conservationists, etc. Members can enjoy the facilities and nature, can assist with conservation effort and can share their interests with other members. Members can hike, camp, participate in archery, and use firearms (rifles, handguns, shotguns, black powder guns). Youth under 18 years of age can learn how to fish in the stocked fish pond.

The Club WILL NOT tolerate any behavior that compromises the safety of our members, neighbors or the general public. Members must adhere to general rules regarding firearms and ammunition. Range rules are posted at shooting ranges and on the website (www.spfga.org). Members must observe

posted shooting times.

SPFGA is affiliated with the Alberta Fish and Game Association (AFGA). Part of your membership fees are paid to AFGA. These fees provide members with insurance (while using the range and facilities), the Outdoor Edge Magazine, discounts at various businesses, and a combined voice on matters of common interest to government and other groups.

Membership Classifications

Regular Membership- No access to Shooting ranges.

Range Membership - Full access to all facilities including shooting ranges.

Youth Membership is open to all young people under 18 years of age.

Dependent includes a spouse/partner and their sons/daughters under 18 years of age.

Retailers do not sell Family Range or Family Regular memberships.

Note: All youth under 18 years of age must be supervised by an adult.

Family Regular Membership: one regular member, a spouse/partner and their dependent children under 18 years of age with no access to shooting ranges.

Family Range Membership: one range member, a spouse/partner and their dependent children under 18 years of age with access to shooting ranges.

Family Range Memberships and Family Regular Memberships DO NOT INCLUDE THE FOL-LOWING:

Parents, brothers, sisters, grandparents, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, cousins, friends and in-law relations.

Children who live at home but are over 18 years of age Family Range or Family Regular classifica-

Other family members e.g. siblings/parents who reside with a member.

All Family Range Members and Family Regular Members <u>must</u> purchase their memberships as follows through the Membership Chair or the Membership Co-Chair.



AFGA Celebrates The Abolition Of the Long Gun Registry!

(Edmonton April 5, 2012)... Alberta's largest conservation group, the Alberta Fish & Game Association (AFGA), is delighted by today's vote in the Senate to dismantle the long gun registry. The gun registry has become a multi-billion dollar burden placed on taxpayers' backs for years while at the same time having no visible impact on crime reduction. The vote was

50 to 27 which included 3 Liberals who did not vote along Party lines!

The AFGA has opposed the registry of long-barreled firearms since day one as it believes that such legislation will not reduce crime. As an example,



handguns have had to be registered since the 1920's and yet they are more prevalent in crime scenes today than ever before.

Criminals simply do not register their firearms.

AFGA President Conrad Fennema said, "The cost of the regis-



try was simply irresponsible spending of taxpayer dollars as was assessed by the auditor general on at least one occasion. The money could have been better spent in dealing with the root causes of crime."

Fears expressed by those with little or no understanding of firearms and their acquisition that anyone will now be able to purchase a long gun are totally unfounded. Individuals who wish to acquire a firearm or ammunition

are still required to have their backgrounds checked, qualify for a licence, and pass a firearms safety course while also complying with all firearms safe storage and transportation requirements. Further, those who already own firearms will also still be required to hold a valid firearms licence. Restricted firearms such as handguns must still be registered.

The Alberta Fish and Game Association is a not-for-profit volunteer organization proud to serve Albertans in the promotion of the wise use of our fish and wildlife resources and the conservation of their habitats. The AFGA has been active since 1908 in working towards these goals and has a province-wide membership of more than 21,400 individuals spread among 100+ Clubs.


