2016 Hunter's night

The Annual Hunters Night meeting was held September 1, 2016 at 7:30 pm in the Old Log Cabin in Sherwood Park. Planning for this annual event is a joint effort between Sherwood Park Fish and Game and the Edmonton Fish and Game Associations. It provides members of both organizations an opportunity to meet with provincial Fish and Wildlife personnel about any changes in the 2016 hunting regulations and wildlife management issues of concern.

The first item of business was a vote to approve the resolution submitted by SPFGA at the 2016 AFGA Annual General Meeting, ``Alberta Environment and Parks increase resident waterfowl hunting opportunity by restricting the number of days, or the timing of the hunting season, or other means, that an outfitter may operate and in so doing, reduce the conflict and competition for receiving access to hunt on private lands``. If approved at the 2017 AGM it will be a AFGA policy statement.

Questions and discussion for the rest of the evening covered a wide range of issues: pheasant release sites and habitats for releases, recovery of deer populations, how draws and quotas for wildlife management units are reached, caribou populations, hunting ethics, legality of drones in hunting, issues of hunters versus anti-hunters.

The meeting ended at 10:30 pm with draws for door prises and the 50-50. Attendance at the evening was 56.

2016 Fun Shoot Results

The Annual Fun Shoot was held in August. This event is a test of shooting skills with shotgun, pistol, rifle and archery. The event consists of a round of trap, pistol shooting for speed and accuracy, rifle fire at paper targets at 100 meters and silhouettes at 300 meters and archery at ?? meters. Participants can shoot all 4 events or any combination of the 4 events. Entry fee for each event is \$5 which includes lunch.

Winner for trap shooting was Lloyd Lacey shooting 24 our of 25 clay pigeons. Kevin was top shooter in the pistol competition with Tony Puhan coming in second. Paul Beauvais was first in the rifle competition for paper targets and silhouettes.

FIREARMS DISCHARGE PERMITS

If your are planning to hunt on a Provincial Recreation Area this fall you will need will need to obtain a Firearms Discharge permit. Firearms discharge permits are required to hunt in the following recreational areas.

Alberta Provincial Recreation Areas:

Cooking Lake-Blackfoot Provincial Recreation Area North Bruderheim Provincial Recreation Area Redwater Provincial Recreation Area Sulpher Gates Provincial Recreation Area

Prior to obtaining a firearms discharge permit, hunters may be required to attend an orientation session. If you have not attended an orientation in the past 5 years or are a first time hunter on the Blackfoot you will be required to attend an orientation session. Phone ahead to register for an orientation session. ()

You will need to provide the following information for a permit: photo id, home address, postal code, telephone contact number, date of birth, WIN number and listing of firearms to be used and game to be hunted.



KETCHAMOOT HIKING TRAILS

The existence of a network of hiking trails at Ketchamoot may be a surprise to some members. In the past it was used as a training ground for biathlon athletes. To make it more user friendly for members "map and arrow signs" and will posted at all trail junctions this fall. The network consists of four loops (red, green, yellow and blue) that are 1.2 to 1.99 km in length. The trailhead for the network (starting point) is at the north end of the garage across from the handgun ranges. Handouts showing the trail and distances will be available at the clubhouse, the trail head and posted on the SPFGA web page (http://www.spfga.org/). The trails wind through forest cover and along wetland areas. If you are walk quietly you may see a moose or deer and water fowl on the sloughs. The trails should also be good for cross country skiing.



Sherwood Park Fish and Game Archery Report



We held two 3D archery shoots this year, the first on May 15 and the second on August 21. There were 19 members at the first and 24 at the second. The course was set up with 21 targets arranged in various hunting situations and appeared to provide a challenge for all. Each shoot consisted of two rounds. There were a variety of targets to shoot at including a mosquito, wolverine, fish, baboon, deer, bear, boar, turkey,

snake, antelope, elk and bison. Distances ranged up to forty yards. Our youngest shooter was Brianna at the age of 4 and we will not say how old the oldest was! Those that attended seemed to enjoy the course, the visiting between rounds and the concession. We had a number of different classes and the winners of the May and August shoot are listed below.

The 3D course has been reduced to twelve targets for the fall for your enjoyment and all targets will be taken in by mid-October or the first snow.


Please remember, there are to be <u>NO broadheads used on the target butts or the 3D targets at any time</u> but you are more than welcome to bring out your own broadhead target. You may also use the sand pit with the old 3D target or the tar paper to sight in.

The archery hunting season is starting shortly and here are some tips that may help make your hunting season successful. Make sure you sight in your broadheads as their point of impact may be different than your field points. You want to have your broadheads razor sharp so you get a quick kill. Dull broadheads make a jagged cut which will quickly clot and make tracking the animal very difficult.

Tips for Bow Hunting

- A range finder is a great piece of equipment and strongly recommended. Even with a
 range finder, it is recommended to practice estimating distances as when that big buck
 steps out in front of you, he make not stay around long enough for you to check the distance with your range finder. You can prepare for him if you ranging various points in
 your shooting lanes once you are in your blind or tree stand. A good point to remember
 is not to be too close to the trail as deer can detect you drawing your bow very easily. It
 is best to be about 20 yards from the trail whether you are in a ground blind or using a
 tree stand.
- It is a good idea to mask your hands and face in some wy as their color is out of place in the bush. They act as a beacon and can cause an animal to spook. Wear a face mask or use face paint and wear gloves all of which are good ideas to overcome this difficulty.
- When you are practicing, wear the same clothes you would use when you are hunting. By doing this, you will know if the string hits your sleeve or your face mask gets in the way. If you use a tree stand, you should practice shooting from it as the point of impact may change when you are shooting down. You may also find the bow contacts the tree or parts of your body especially if the animal is almost right under you. Once you are in your blind or tree stand, practice drawing your bow and lining up on the various shooting lanes you have. This will identify any interference you may not have noticed previously. Remember even a small branch will deflect an arrow enough to cause a miss.
- One should set some rules for shooting distances. Arrows only travel about 300 feet per second and an animal can do a lot in the time it takes for the arrow to reach it. My wife and I have a rule that if the animal is more than 30 yards away well, we will see it tomorrow! For shots beyond this distance one runs a high risk of only wounding the animal.
- For those using a tree stand, be safe and use a safety harness when going up or down and while up there waiting for your animal to show. It only takes one slip, you could fall and it may be a long time before someone comes to help you.
- For those that have caught the 3D bug, here are some equipment tips. One should get a set of binoculars and I have found a set of 10x42 works really well. I prefer a belt quiver for carrying my arrows as opposed to a bow quiver. This way I can carry other things like ivory soap for lubricating my arrows, a big screw driver for getting arrows out of trees and my release when I have finished shooting. One may want to consider a bow pod so the bow is not left lying on the ground for someone to step on while you are retrieving arrows. 3D is pretty much over until January and Christmas is between now and then should anyone need any Christmas gift ideas for the archer in the house! Hope you have a great hunting season and above all, be safe and enjoy the outdoors. Al Keeler
