Big Game Summary Report from the 87th Annual Alberta Fish and Game Conference February 2016



Given the new provincial government and the most recent reorganization in the government departments that control big game policy, regulations and enforcement, it is not surprising that the government is taking time to rethink what it is doing and how it does it with respect to game management in Alberta. Overall we are seeing that habitat conservation is playing a more dominate role and a desire to re-establish communication

with stakeholders at the grass roots level using the internet.

The plans so far are to:

- -Revise the Fish and wildlife Policy in 2016
- Begin work on the guide allocation policy
- -Review the Provincial Wildlife Regulations by June 30, 2016
- -Establish a new consultation model
- Address topical issues such as Sheep Management and Chronic Wasting Disease

That said, what has been done that will impact us in 2016. We know from last year that the game bird season was extended with a lower daily bag limit, a spring snow goose season was introduced and moose and elk weekly seasons were extended in the agricultural management zones. For 2016 – 2017 there will be increased opportunity for elk and moose and some restrictions in the Suffield elk hunt to address problems that occurred in the past. There should also be increased cougar hunting opportunities in 2016.

Changes to sheep hunting regulations to establish a full curl minimum size south of the Brazeau River and the introduction of a sand hill crane season need to be reviewed at the ministerial level and may or may not be approved in time for the 2016 season.

There wasn't any data presented on the 2015 hunting season other than to say that a mule deer taken in WMU 252 was diagnosed with chronic wasting disease. This is the farthest west the disease has been detected and the ministry is following up on it. The 2015 data should soon be available on the "mywildalberta" website.

In terms of consultation a new group has been set up to replace the previous Alberta Game Management advisory group (AGMAG). The new body is the Alberta Game Policy Advisory Committee (AGPAC). We only have one representative in that group, the president of the Alberta Fish and Game Association. No doubt he will do his best to represent us and we will do our best to communicate your concerns upward through our organization but if you want direct input you will have to keep an eye on the Albertarelm, mywildalberta, and Alberta Fish and Game websites and complete the survey requests as they become available.

We have been told to expect:

Elk and mule deer management plan updates by March 31, 2016.

Draft management planfor black bears by March 31, 2016.

An update of the grizzly bear recovery plan to be made public for review.

Please take advantage of these opportunities to let your thoughts be known. We were told that hunting and angling contributes \$1.8 billion dollars to the Alberta economy annually and that the number of hunters has increased to approximately 128 thousand in 2015. Still, hunters are only 5% of the voting age population. Of those hunters, only 30% complete the Albertarelm harvest questionnaire to provide on the ground data that can directly impact the hunting opportunities we have available to us.

It was clearly stated that the government objectives were to conserve and protect habitat and conserve the species to ensure they can meet treaty obligations. Our needs and wants are apparently somewhere lower on that list of objectives. It was also stated that we need to maintain a critical mass to keep our hunting and fishing agendas on the political radar of those that we elected to represent us both federally and provincially. To do this we need to speak loudly enough, clearly enough and often enough to command the attention of our law makers. They say they want transparency and open dialogue. Please take every opportunity to give it to them.

Resilient Bighorn Project



As part of the Resilient Bighorn Project we are examining bighorn sheep response to climate and other sources of environmental variation by measuring annual growth rings (i.e. annuli).

To obtain annuli from the past we are requesting people who have male bighorn sheep heads, for which they know the year and approximate location of death, to allow us to measure annuli. The Province of Alberta has begun to measure horn annuli length in all bighorn sheep that are registered.

Annual growth rings are formed in mountain sheep horns when growth stops in winter. During the year of annuli growth, the cost to the sheep of maintenance and reproduction, relative to resources available, strongly influences the amount of nutrient and energy available for horn growth. The general influence of changes in environmental conditions on horn growth can be estimated made by comparing annuli length and circumference to environmental conditions (e.g. weather) and vegetation for the year of annuli growth. These results improve the ability to manage the environment to advantage mountain sheep and to better manage hunting.

Horn annuli data will be used by taking all annuli that grew in a given year, standardizing for the greater rate of growth in younger years, and comparing to climate data for that year. Vegetation characteristics of sheep ranges may also be compared with annuli where data from remote sensing allows. Our intent is to test the influence of these changes in the environment on the growth rates of horn annuli.

Archery—Report



My name is Al Keeler. My wife, Lori, and I have been in archery, especially 3D, for the past 14 years and previously were 3D directors for the Sherwood Park Archery club. I am pleased to have been asked to be the archery director for the Sherwood Park Fish and Game Association and hope to make it an eventful year. My plans for the coming year are to improve the 3D course, obtain some new 3D targets, attract some new archers to the sport and have a couple of shoots.

To start off, I am happy to announce the executive

have approved the purchase of a number of new Rinehart targets which have arrived and are stored until the lanes are ready. We have approval to create some new shooting lanes on the 3D course and will increase the number of lanes to twenty. The course will be setup in the shape of a loop shooting at targets on one side and coming back down the other side. The lane distances will range up to 50 yards and hopefully provide some typical hunting challenges. If you are interested in seeing the proposed lanes, the trees have been marked with orange paint.

We would really appreciate all those that are interested in helping out with a work party join us on Saturday, April 9th starting at 9:00 am, weather permitting (snow or pouring rain) otherwise it will be the same time on Saturday, April 16th. The plan for the day is to clear the target and access lanes, cut up and clear all the fallen trees along the paths, clean up all debris, and set out the targets. We will need chainsaws, pruning shears, gloves, a couple heavy hammers, rakes and lots of muscle. Hotdogs and pop will be provided.

SPFGA Archery is proposing to have a members' **3D** shoot on Sunday, May **15th**. We will look at having another shoot in August. Watch for details on the website and information posted at the range.

At the present, there are no guidelines for using the archery range. For safety purposes, a list will be posted at the archery building and at the start of the 3D course. No broadheads or practice broadhead usage will be allowed anywhere except the sand pit. This is located on the right hand side of the archery field. You are welcome to bring your own broadhead target if you prefer. For the crossbow enthusiasts, the executive have approved the use of crossbows on the 3D course. Hope you enjoy. For those getting ready for bear hunting season, a cheap broadhead target can be made from the blue 2'x 8'x 2" styrofoam insulation panels you can get from the lumberyard. Cut the panel into 4-2'panels and duct tape together to get a 2'x2'x8" block. This arrangement will easily stop arrows from bows with draw weight up to 50 lbs. If shooting higher poundage, add a couple more panels.

Arrows shot at target butts and 3D targets are stopped by friction. Using an arrow lubricant will make arrow removal easier and extend the life of the targets. There are different types of arrow lubricant that one can use. The cheapest arrow lube is a bar of Ivory soap and it works very well when applied to the front of the arrow.

Hope to see you on the course and may your arrows fly true, Al Keeler

Gate Access Card

You must swipe your access card to enter and exit the range facility.

Remember: If you follow someone into the range facility or follow someone leaving the range facility, you still have to swipe your access card to enter and exit the range facility.

If you do not swipe your access card to exit, our system still thinks you are at the range facility, so when you when you go to the range again, you won't get into the facility. Here's what you have to do:

- 1. Go over (or under) the gate and swipe your access card to open the gate.
- 2. Close the gate but do not drive your vehicle into the facility.
- 3. When you are at the entrance, swipe your access card to unlock the gate
- 4. Open the gate and drive your vehicle into the facility
